



2020 a year to be remembered mostly for all the wrong reasons!

This time last year I wrote, "As I write this President's Foreword we are now in a Coronavirus nightmare, the country is in lockdown, all Otter training has been suspended for the foreseeable future, the 2020 Olympics have been postponed, and almost everyone other than essential services workers is at home with only very restricted ability to go outside. We are living in profoundly unusual and anxious times."

Sadly, it did not get much better through the rest of the year. However, in between lockdowns, we did manage to get in some masters swimming and a little bit of water polo. But now, at last, things are looking positive for a proper return to the sport we all love, although I suspect we will have to live with a degree of restriction for some time yet before "normality" returns.

It has been one of the most traumatic and existential challenges that aquatic sports in the UK has ever faced. Many swimming clubs have faced major financial difficulties, indeed some have been forced to fold. Some swimming pools closed for lockdown will never reopen again and others, e.g. Crystal Palace, are likely to remain closed for some time to come. Otter has not been immune from any of those issues, but happily our relatively strong financial position has made things easier.

I would like to thank everyone who has contributed to keeping the Club together in these difficult times, especially the Committee, the Swimming and Water Polo Captains, our Coaches, our pool bookers and all who helped with putting in place all the systems, procedures and risk assessments we needed to operate in the Covid world.

I also want to thank those who organised the numerous virtual training sessions and virtual Otter social get-togethers that took place during the year. Such virtual activities can never be a proper substitute for the real thing, but nevertheless it was very pleasing to see those Club activities taking place and being mostly driven by members/sections own initiatives rather than top-down from the Committee.

2020 was a trying year for all of us, and there will be knock on impacts yet to come, but I am supremely confident that Otter will return as strong as ever, when we are allowed.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OVERVIEW

This was a crazy year in many ways yet, from a financial perspective, there was not much to write home about.

Overall, the Club showed an operating surplus of £3.0k, compared to the operating deficit in the prior year of £28.6k (which included £12.3k for the 150th Anniversary Costs).

As would be expected given the periods of lockdown leaving only 5 months of activity in the year, membership income reduced considerably. On a pro-rated basis, income was broadly in line with 2019. Coaching costs in 2020 were half of 2019, primarily since 2019 coaching costs were under budget. Pool costs in 2020 reduced considerably on a pro-rated basis due to the reversal of some accrued costs that proved unnecessary. Aside from these three key totals, the year was relatively stable.

Membership numbers, excluding those who would compete only in the water polo age group tournaments, declined without the usual influx of joiners we, as a central London club, tend to see throughout the calendar year (20 joiners, mostly at the very start of the year, 95 leavers).

The balance sheet strengthened as a result of the small surplus and donations received (more below). As a result of this, we were able to sustain investment in pool time throughout the various periods where COVID rules restricted attendance. Looking forward, particularly as we start to re-enter some level of normality, the committee continues to consider options to expand the sessions available to the Club's members.

PRIZES & GENERAL FUND AND MEMORIAL FUND DONORS

The generosity of members, either in paying over and above their regular subscriptions or in making separate designated donations, continues to help manage the Club's annual costs as well as strengthen the capital base. In addition, a number of members kept subs going through the lockdown period, and these have been treated as donations. As such, we thank the following:

MEMBER NEWS OBITUARIES

KELVIN JUBA

Kelvin Juba was born into a family immersed in swimming. Aged one, he was taken by his parents, Bill, later a hugely popular coach to Otter, and Josie, a national champion and also a successful coach, to the 1948 Olympics to witness the events held at the Wembley Pool.

During the late 1950s, Kelvin and his younger brother Nick, later to become coach to the Danish national team, took part in the Otter Junior sessions at Chelsea, where their father oversaw the Saturday evening workouts. Both then progressed to the senior sessions.

Kelvin competed across a range of disciplines, competitive indoor swimming, water polo, in which he was a British under 21 international and in open water events. In 1962, he was 7th in the national long-distance championships, when five of the first eight finishers were members of this club. Kelvin also won the Welsh National title.

However, his greatest contribution to this club and to British swimming came after his retirement from serious competition. When his father died in 1970, Otter was desperate to find a successor as a Head Coach and Kelvin took over the role for three years.

At the same time, he became Editor of Swimming Times, the now defunct monthly magazine of the ASA (England Swimming), of which his father had been assistant editor. He reported the 1972 Olympics, one of several Games he attended.

Most important of all, it was Kelvin, who in 1972 was the leading mover in holding the first Masters meet in this country after the concept had been started in the United States by Dr Ransom Arthur, a former Otter member.

Kelvin then co-wrote books with David Wilkie, the 1976 Olympic 200 metres breaststroke champion, with whom he set up a marketing company, did an instructional TV series with Channel 4 and ran a swim school in the west country, where he was based. He also studied for three degrees at Bath and Bristol Universities.

His all-round knowledge of swimming was extraordinary. One former ASA Chief Executive, when needing the answer to a question,

used to tell his staff to ask 'Anorak One.' Kelvin established with the European Swimming League (LEN) a continental-wide programme entitled 'Learn to Swim, Prevent Drowning.'

Kelvin will be much missed by his family, members of this club and thousands of people in the swimming world.

PHIL PENNY

Dr. Phil Penny was a GP, occupational health physician and a leading breaststroke and butterfly competitor. In addition, he made a huge contribution to the sport by being the medical officer to the Amateur Swimming Association (now Swim England) and especially in his work examining the best ways of disinfecting pools.

During his career in the late 1940s and early 1950s, increasing numbers of breaststroke swimmers used butterfly arms with an orthodox breaststroke leg action before being finally separated into the two competitive techniques. The Somerset ASA records that Phil was an international in 1951 and 1953, although the Otter archives cannot confirm the latter. He had joined the club in 1952. In 1955, he was a member of the Otter team, who won the National medley relay title with Phil on the fly leg.

He was the Western Counties Medical Officer 1958-1984 and chaired the ASA facilities committee 1979-2005. For many years, first under a government department in 1975 and then as chair of the Independent Pool Water Treatment Advisory Group, Phil was an authoritative figure on the methods of disinfectant. In 2012, his work was recognized by receiving the prestigious Harold Fern award at the ASA Council dinner. Modern swimmers have much to thank Phil for.



SUSAN PEARCE

I only knew Susan for a few years while she was in London but I, and a generation of female water polo players, owe her a depth of gratitude. One that we can only ever repay by playing and winning -Susan was very competitive indeed - in the sport she loved.

Susan was a founding member of the Otter Swimming Club Ladies Water Polo team. Today we have the best junior development programme in the country and are in the top three at the senior level. This would not have been possible without Susan's vision, drive and determination. It is a true legacy that she has left, halfway across the world, to the enduring benefit of countless young women.

20 years ago women's water polo in London was a desert. When I came to London after university in 1997 there was one team, with whom I didn't gel and so I stopped playing. It wasn't until 2002 that Otter Ladies Water Polo was founded, with Susan attending the first ever training session. Right from the beginning she was instrumental in setting up the squad, acting as Vice-Captain. The Captain at the time, Ruth Bickerton, recalls how unflappable and organised Susan was both in and out of the water – dealing with opponents and administrative red tape with the same no-nonsense attitude.

One of the men's coaches at the time remembers her battling it out with the boys in the tiny London pool Otter Ladies started in, her fighting spirit definitely showed up inside and outside the water. He also keenly remembers her technical expertise, using a video that had been recorded of her doing a step half turn to get the rest of the teams to do it properly.

Initially Vice-Captain, Susan swiftly became Captain in 2003 as she was able and willing to devote the time and administration needed to set up a team from scratch, and clearly the best person for the job, a natural leader.

When I joined the team in 2005 she was my first captain at the club. One of my first memories of meeting Susan was her smile. It was vibrant and brilliant, and made me feel welcome immediately. But that was outside the pool.

Inside the pool she was a demon. A fast counter attacker, she had very strong legs and a great shot but overall, and what I think was crucial to Otter's early success, she had a will to win and the dedication and commitment to put in the work required to do so. She also had an enviable ability to transmit this to the rest of the team.

Once in the water, game or training, she was all business, and this attitude helped mould, to this day, the Otter approach which underpins our success. This is not just me saying this now, every single person who played with Susan will say the same. The Otter Annual Report from 2005 records that Susan "continues to lead, inspire and gel the team into the force we are today - truly the backbone of our success".

When Susan stood down as Captain and retired due to the increasing demands of work in 2007, her legacy was set in stone. She had taken the team from a new entrant at the bottom Division 3 of the British National Water Polo League, to winning it and promotion into Division 2.

Susan worked closely with our Ladies' coach, Nick Buller, in whom I know she found a kindred spirit to work together to push the team to fulfil its potential and reach Division 1. He has said many times that without her, we would not be where we are now. Otter and water polo has been a continuing passion for me and although I sadly lost touch with Susan personally over the years since she returned to New Zealand, her legacy has shaped my life. I also know in my heart that she has shaped the lives and character of the many women that have trained and played with Otter since.

GEORGE HANCOCK

George's formative years were spent with Avondale SC in Battersea where he grew up and honed his waterpolo skills. Avondale were the ASA Champions in 1946 and ASA Junior Champions in 1954. Although he played in neither of these teams being either too young or too old, he grew up in a culture of first class waterpolo.

He was enticed to join Otter to strengthen the Club's playing power as a full back to combat the big sitting forwards that were prevalent in those days in the post war era. The pools that the games were played in were local swimming baths, narrow and shallow, and the game had similarity to rugby in the water.

George was a powerful and tough player, but was always fair. He had great anticipation and read the game extremely well and enjoyed coaching the younger members. In 1961 he was one of the Otter touring team to Yugoslavia where the Club was invited to participate in the opening swimming and waterpolo gala of the new 50 metre, 2 metre deep, open air pool in Dubrovnik. A big change from the British swimming baths.

George was in his element as passenger in Brian Zimmerman's triumph TR3 sports car on the four day road and boat journey to Dubrovnik. This tour was the highlight of his waterpolo career and he often reminisced with his son Mark. He was given the nickname of "George double Hancock" having enticed Eric Kimber, our coach, to provide him with double portions of nourishment at resting places to sustain his big frame. Otter benefited tremendously from this tour and went on to win the ASA Waterpolo Championship in 1964.

George was Captain of the successful Surrey team who were the County Champions and he represented the Southern Counties in Western European events. George was an Otter member 1957 to 1968, and was awarded First Team Water Polo colours 1957 to 1961. He was a great asset to the Club and a loyal friend to many. A larger than life character who is well remembered by those of his generation.


CLUB PERFORMANCE: LADIES' WATERPOLO

The 2019-20 season has been a difficult period for all and women's water polo was no exception. A major highlight in a challenging year was Otter winning the British Championships Water Polo Festival and placing 4th in the Super Fives (before lockdown stopped play) with Katy Cutler as the second highest goal scorer. The young Otter Lutra team came sixth in Championship 2, and while they go down to Division Three for this coming season, with 5 players picked for the Great Britain u17s European Championship team, we are looking forward to a strong performance from them this year. On the negative side the closure of Crystal Palace due to a leak in the 50m pool has severely impacted our training. We have found a new session at Alleyn's School and, at least for the older players, there was a bittersweet return to our beginnings with a session at the Queen Mother's Sports Centre in Victoria.

OUR LOCKDOWN TRAINING

Women's water polo carried on training throughout the various lockdowns. For most of it we had to move to land training with 3 sessions a week via zoom but we also managed to fit in a few outdoor water polo sessions at Divers Cove in the early summer. A number of the girls had pools installed in their back gardens so they could continue training and swim and polo skills sessions were made available to them by the coaches. A huge thanks goes to Croydon Swimming and Water Polo Club who shared their pool time at Whitgift Pool with us so, during the break between the first and second lockdowns, and with Crystal Palace shut, the players were able to get in a weekly pool session. Our gratitude also goes to Alleyn's School who kindly stepped in with pool time for ad hoc training camps and then a weekly session after they heard we were left with no sessions.



MEN'S 2ND TEAM

So we thought the 2020 season might be a bit of a challenge. As it turned out we couldn't have been more right, but for all the wrong reasons. We knew it was likely to be a transition year, with some rebuilding to do after a number of players left London and the club to do other things. We hoped some of the juniors would be ready to step up and fully contribute to the senior team, and had high hopes.

The Thameside Water Polo Cup started with a famous win over Croydon, when they conceded without fielding a team. Through to the next round, we focussed on the League, playing in Division 1 and starting for us in December 2019, with an away game at Whitgift to play Croydon again. They had by now found some players. Never an easy fixture, we travelled with a scratch side and valiantly went down 14-6. Clearly we had work to do. However, the Christmas break intervened which may have helped our buovancy more than agility, and our next two games against Poly Purples followed rapidly by Citizen's, both away, saw another two defeats. Our first home game came at the end of February, the return leg against Citizen's. The first half saw us go down 3-8, but a third quarter fightback meant we started the final quarter at 7-9. Another goal meant the gap was now one, before Citizen's pulled away again. We had improved, but still lost 13-8, with James Hindle and Sarpel Ustenel each claiming a brace of goals. A week later and we faced the return leg of Croydon at home. In a tightly fought and aggressive contest we had 8 exclusions in the game to their 7, but managed to come away winners with a score of 13-8. Danny Davies, Sarpel, Chris Eden and Grant Monk each got a pair of goals, and at last we were heading in the right direction.

At this point we were due to play our next leg of the Cup against Orcas, but we never managed to arrange the fixture. Similarly our home game against Poly Purples, which should have rounded out the Thameside League, never happened. Lockdown, or as we now call it, Lockdown One, meant pools closed and we couldn't do anything. We got used to working from home, home schooling, and being a bit diminished in our outlook. Frustratingly when lockdown one eventually lifted the indoor pools stayed shut.

As the summer came at least the outdoor pools opened and even for those of us whose ideas of fun do not start with swimming laps in a cold pool, the relief to get back in the water was palpable. Our coach Mariete offered Zoom land training which some took up, but this was a step beyond Joe Wick's fancy dress Friday stuff. I am sure some camera-shy players took advantage on their own time, quietly appreciating it.

As indoor pools eventually opened there was hope that we could get back to polo again. Swim England produced a roadmap to get polo going again and we dared to plan ahead. That the guidelines included seemingly arbitrary and nonsensical things like washing balls and equipment after play (in chlorinated water perhaps?) didn't faze us. If Swim England said swap water polo caps for a feather boa, at this point we'd just want to know what colour if it meant we could play. But before we could start, Lockdow 2 hit us, and the pools shut again. When that finished and pools opened again we still couldn't start polo, so we went back to laps in the vague hope that when we could play again we would be able to remember how not to drown. Christmas and Lockdow meant pools shut again, so it felt like even that might have been an ambitious target. However looking on the bright side, some players have used their time productively, and I congratulate and give best wishes for Ivor Sokolic and his wife Rhi for their daughter Emilia born just recently.

We have now been unable to play polo for over a full year. Looking ahead, as pools have finally re-opened again, we hope to get started soon. There will certainly be challenges, and more than just the normal rebuilding a team. Many players have moved out of London seeking more space and sunnier climes while working from home. Whether and when they come back is uncertain. Pool hire is going to be fiendishly competitive, and getting the training time we want may be difficult. Over a year ago we thought bringing Juniors into the Senior team would be helpful. Now maybe it's essential. Nonetheless, the first day back at training should be a busy one. There is plenty of pent-up demand!


